

Remembering those who served

Glen Russell stood at attention, saluting as Laura Piasecki sang the National Anthem during Sunday's Veteran's Day Ceremony at the Lebanon National Ceremony.

Russell was just one of several veterans in attendance for the ceremony, and the meaning of the day wasn't lost on him.

"I'm thankful that the community recognizes those who served," said Russell, who retired as a colonel after 38 years of service in the U.S. Army, 28 of those with the 100th Division. "We are blessed to have this national cemetery in our community."

"Today we remember those who fought for freedom," said Bill Hartley with the Kentucky Cemetery Committee. "Their legacy is the very foundation of this country's strength."

The ceremony was hosted by VFW Post 5910 with Commander LTC(R) Joseph L. Livers serving as master of ceremonies. The VFW post, along with American Legion Post 49 and the Marion County Veterans Honor Guard, sponsored the ceremony.

The guest speaker was Brigadier General Brian Wertzler, who serves as the Deputy Adjutant General (Army) for the Kentucky National Guard. Wertzler has served 32 for 32 years and was

deployed to both Afghanistan in Operation Enduring Freedom) and Iraq (Operation Iraqi Freedom).

"On Veteran's Day our nation stops in silence to pay tribute to heroes who don't see themselves as heroes," Wertzler said. "The veterans who wrote a blank check made payable to America for up to and including their life." Wertzler noted how many veterans served tour after our in distant and dangerous places "to give others a chance for a better life" and who "left the safety of sovereign soil to fight tyrants."

"To be born free is an accident," Wertzler said. "To live free, a privilege and to die free a responsibility. These veterans were dedicated to a cause far greater than themselves."

Wertzler said that every soldier, from private to general, lives their lives by the same code of loyalty, duty, respect, selfless service, honor and integrity.

"Freedom is not free," he noted. "Don't just say thank you to a veteran. Let your words bring forth action."

Stephanie McCarty, along with Air Traffic Control Senior Chief Petty Officer Tommy Zottman with VFW Post 5910 and American Legion Post 49 Commander Stanley Gaddie then participated in the Presentation of the Wreath in honor of McCarty's father.

Members of the Marion County Jr. ROTC presented the colors while the Marion County High School Band provided music. The Marion County Veterans Honor Guard participated in the Retirement of the Colors along with the ROTC. Lebanon Mayor Gary Crenshaw and Marion County Judge Executive David Daugherty were also on hand.



Brigadier General John C. Hafley

Commanding General, 100th Training Division

John C. Hafley was born in St. Louis, Missouri on May 15, 1970. He graduated from Southeast Missouri State University in 1993 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice, from South Texas College of Law in 2007 with a Doctorates of Jurisprudence, and from the United States Army War College in 2015 with a Master's in Strategic Studies.

Brigadier General Hafley began his military career in 1991 as an SMP in the Missouri Army National Guard. He commissioned in the Army Reserve in 1993. His key developmental positions include platoon leader in detachment one, 366th Military Police Company, Huntsville, TX, Company Commander of the 366th Military Police Company, Stillwater, Oklahoma, and Battalion S3, Executive Officer, and Battalion Commander in the 607th Military Police Battalion, Grand Prairie, Texas. He deployed to Iraq as the BN S3 in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2009. Other positions include OPFOR Controller and Group S1, in the 1st BDE, 75th Division (Training Support), Deputy G6 in the 75th Training Command, Houston, Texas, served as the Foreign Military Sales Case Advisor for the Ministry of Interior Military Assistance Group in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, and as the ADCS, G3/5/7 of the 102nd Training Division, Ft. Leonard Wood, MO, and Brigade Commander of the 11th Military Police Brigade, Los Alamitos, CA. He then served as the Deputy Commanding General-Support for the 88th Readiness Division at Ft.

McCoy, WI. He currently serves as the Commanding General of the 100th Training Division (Leader Development).

Brigadier General Hafley graduated from the Military Police Officer Basic and Advance courses, the Combined Arms Services Staff School, the Command and General Staff Officers Intermediate Learning Education Course, The United States Army War College, and several other military courses. His awards include the Bronze Star Medal, five Meritorious Service Medals, the Army Commendation Medal, and two Army Achievement Medals, amongst others.

Brigadier General Hafley is a former police officer, Assistant District Attorney, and is currently the owner and controlling member of The Law Office of John C. Hafley, PLLC located in Conroe, TX. Brigadier General Hafley and his wife have two children.
