A Memorable Evening at Our 2025 Convention Joe Militano and *The Sons of Bitche*

Our 2025 AOC Annual Convention in Owensboro, Kentucky, was one to remember — and much of that is thanks to our featured guest speaker, Mr. Joe Militano.



Joe had the crowd completely captivated as he shared the powerful story of the 100th Infantry Division and its incredible march across France during World War II. Drawing from his book, *The Sons of Bitche*, Joe painted a vivid picture of the "rag-tag" soldiers who were never meant to be a combat division — a mix of actors from a discontinued War Show Task Force and college students from a canceled Army program. But when called to fight, they proved everyone wrong.

As Joe told it, "They were supposed to be a show division, not a fighting one — but they ended up attacking the Maginot Line, one of the toughest German strongholds on the Rhine. By the time the dust settled, the 100th had advanced farther east than any other division of the U.S. Seventh Army."

Joe's connection to this story runs deep. His father proudly served with the 100th during WWII, and that family bond inspired Joe's lifelong passion for preserving the division's history. Before becoming an author, Joe spent more than four decades as an investigative reporter and senior defense industry executive. He's also the former publisher of *The Defender* and editor of *I Remember Papa: A Sicilian-American's Century*, a heartfelt collection that includes the story of a young U.S. soldier leaving for war in France.

During the convention, Joe didn't just speak — he spent the day with us in the Supply Room, chatting with members, signing books, and personalizing each copy with genuine care. He even donated copies of *The Sons of Bitche* for the AOC Supply Room to sell, with 100% of the proceeds going directly to AOC — an incredibly generous gesture we're so grateful for.

- Click Update Contact Information

Step 3: Update Your Info

- Fix your phone, address, email—whatever's outdated.
- Want your newsletter by **email instead of snail mail**? Click **Yes** (Mother Nature and Ben Zimmerman will thank you).
- Important: Pick Yes or No for the newsletter, or the site will throw a tantrum.
- Click **SAVE PROFILE & LOGOUT**—your info is now officially fresh!

Step 4: Abort Mission?

- Hit the red LOGOUT at the top.
- Warning: Do NOT hit the back arrow unless you enjoy website drama.

Corridor of the Century

It is time again to recommend Nominees for the Corridor of the Century. Nominations are due 1 June 2026. Nominees must have been truly outstanding in all phases of their Army careers and are no longer assigned to the 100th Division. Contributions by nominees to the excellence of the 100th Division is of primary importance and continued support of the Division is highly desirable. Any former 100th Division Soldier is eligible for nomination. As a minimum, each of the following categories shall be addressed, but nominations are certainly not limited to these areas:

- Years of service in the 100th Division
- · Highest Rank Achieved
- Positions held in the 100th Division (and timed served in each, if available)
- Association of the Century Membership, Life or Annual.
- Decorations and awards,
- Extraordinary contributions to the 100th Division. (This category shall be expansive in narrative and specific in nature. This is the most important category in the determination of selectees.)
- Other Community Service
- 1. Nominations must be typed, single space, to include awards and decorations on one page, and should include an 8"x10" head and shoulders photo.

I want to share some things I have experienced from traveling this great USA and overseas. One of the best benefits of being a retired soldier is having more choices of places to stay.


