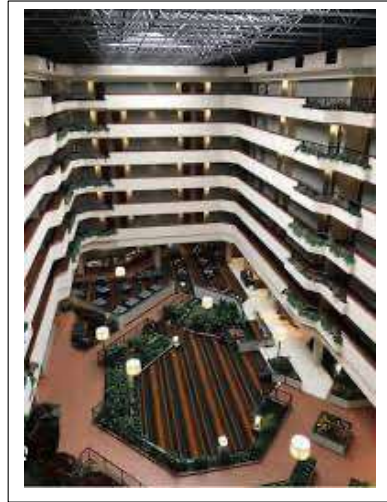

100th Division at FORT CHAFFEE, Arkansas, 1961

Do you realize this year is the 65th anniversary of the 100th Division being mobilized for the Berlin Crisis? I can remember as a young man watching our television and listening to Walter Cronkite talk about, missiles, Cuba, Berlin Wall, and potential war. Little did I know what was going on in the State of Kentucky.

Approximately 3000 men (Soldiers) of the 100th Division Army Reserve were being mobilized for a mission unseen since World War II. From 25 September 1961 to 15 August 1962, they reported to Ft Chaffee, AR and carried out the mission as assigned to them. Their Job was to receive, support, train, and furnish a highly motivated and qualified new soldier to fill the ranks of the United States Army.

The Spirit of the soldier was exemplified by these soldiers of the 100th Division. Many were veterans of World War II. Many joined after the war. Their military training, experiences and additional skills gained from their civilian employment contributed to quickly revitalizing a military post into an excellent training center.

In one year, the personnel of the 100th Division trained approximately 18300 new soldiers in Basic Combat Training, 9400 in Infantry, 1800 in Supply and Cook School. With specialized schooling (leadership courses, refresher courses), the number was about 32000 soldiers passing through the railroad receiving station on post.

I must make mention of the 100th Division units with storied backgrounds. They were the 397th, 398th, 399th, 100th and the 400th Regiments. The soldiers belonging to these units came from all over Kentucky.

Big and small cities and towns – Lexington, Ft Thomas, Louisville, LaGrange, Shelbyville, Richmond, Berea, Beattyville, Irvine, Corbin, Somerset, Manchester, Pineville, Hyden, Owensboro, Henderson, Madisonville, Providence, Mayfield, Paducah, Clinton, Lebanon, Danville, Harrodsburg, Bowling Green, Burkesville, Hopkinsville, Dawson Springs, Winchester, Paris, Mount Sterling, Nicholasville, Neon, Cynthiana, Williamstown, Georgetown, Hardinsburg, Morehead, Flemingsburg, Campbellsville, Frankfort, Evarts, Murray, Lawrenceburg and Central City,

They answered the call and carried out their assigned mission. To all these Ft Chaffee veterans, thank you for a job well done.

In my career, I crossed paths with soldiers trained by the 100th Division Cadre at Ft Chaffee.

They always commented, “I was well trained”.

Retired Veterans Vacation Travel Tips By MSG George Bohannon, Ret.

In April, my wife and I took a 12-day trip to Washington State. It was such a beautiful time of the year and the crowds were small. We flew into Seattle and the good times started.

We spent our first night at a Holiday Inn on Ft Lewis. Do you know they have a Texas Road House on base? This was a first. The next morning, the wife got our only photo of Mt. Rainier, background to "Iron Mike", the Infantryman. Our plans were to drive around the Olympic National Park, allowing three days. The first day found us at Ruby Beach (sea stacks, driftwood, tide pools) and Kalaloch Lodge and Beach (Tree of Life). We spent the night at a tiny Navy motel at Pacific Beach (off the grid). The second day took us to the Hoh Rainforest (elk herd, wettest spot in US), Lake Crescent and Merrymere waterfall. The third night placed us in Port Angeles. From there we took a ferry to Victoria BC and spent the day walking and browsing around town. This was a beautiful harbor, parks, and old British government building. A ferry ride back across Puget Sound, good night sleep, and we were ready for the next adventure. It had been closed due to snow, but luckily, we got to drive up Hurricane Ridge Road to the higher area of Olympic Park. Great views awaited us and it was a clear day. On to Port Townsend, another town on the Puget Sound. We spent two days walking the hills, visiting the small ship yards. There are a lot of pre-World War II coastal defense sites up and down the sound. Some are great parks to visit and offer views you will always remember.

We took the ferry from Port Townsend to Whidbey Island, home of a US Navy Air Base. We spent the night at their lodge. This island is one of my favorite places and it is beautiful. You must cross the narrows bridge and this is amazing to watch the tide waters flow through the narrows. Next, we headed to the Washington State TULIP festival. In April, the area farmers have acres of so many varieties of tulips. Lastly, we visited Seattle for two days. We did the Space Needle (formal restaurant gone), Pike's fish market, and all up and down the wharfs. We probably averaged walking 4 miles a day, but we slept well.

The only disappointment was not being able to drive up Mt Rainier. They had blizzard conditions while we were there. You were not allowed to drive very far without snow chains on your tires. Do you remember those and even how to put them on?

Talk about travel, but do it.
